	Closed event for ERC member states and CSO members only The increasing push-back against LGBTQI+ implies that resourcing the movement is becoming increasingly complex. This conversation between activists, governments, and rapid response funders is designed to explore risk from multiple perspectives and to contribute to a greater shared understanding, so as to ensure that work to defend fundamental freedoms continues while also safeguarding activists and communities.	This session looks at how LGBTQI+ civil society is tackling the alarming trend of rising hate crimes and violence based on sexual orientation and/or gender identity and shows how the anti-gender/trans/rights movements are driving this increase. It explores best practices to address hate crimes, including by CSOs working in partnerships across institutions and communities.
